Bluewater—Thursday 23rd June







With skills as diverse as weather predictions and analysis to maritime chart reading they recorded the potential of renewables to be used in a cross-curricular project. The London International Boat Show



It has been a while since this event but we are keen for more schools to take advantage of this splendid opportunity in the future

It takes place indoors at the prestigious London International Boat Show; good job since it is a winter rather than a summer event. The only class is solar, so we hope as the years go by, and with the other marine events, schools will push the frontiers of development here, in a world where sustainable energy issues are increasingly important. With an indoor event the ambient light is not sufficient enough to power the solar panels. However, this is merely a reflection of what happens in real life and at this event schools were able to use our strong lamps to charge the super capacitors needed to power the solar panels.

With lots of attractions and other things to see and do, and the schools arriving at different times, it seemed a good plan to have a Leader Board announcing the best times. It meant that schools could have a few attempts and did not have to wait for formal races to begin, allowing them the freedom to access the other attractions at the show. It proved successful and by the end of the morning, Wilmington Academy had gained the best time, an incredible 14.39 seconds for one of their runs, with Leigh Academy in second place with 18.31 seconds and Haberdashers Askes Hatchem in third place with 18.6 seconds. Our congratulations go to them and especially since both Wilmington and Haberdash-

ers Askes are brand new to the scheme and only signed up a matter of weeks ago. It just goes to show what can be achieved with determination and enthusiasm and a competitive team spirit to be the best.

Other participants included Astley Sports College who came all the way from Cheshire to be with us, with their truly innovative plastic bottle and cardboard designs, Priory Lodge, another new school of extremely keen young competitors, Team Popin, a church group run by an ex Technology teacher, St Birinus School for Boys, Shipston High School and Seaford College. All had something slightly different to offer in terms of craft or best technique and all left with a keenness to further hone their designs ready for next year's challenge.
